

### Henderson County 4-H Photography Clinic

Henderson County Agrilife Extension and Amylu Photography teamed up and hosted a county wide photography clinic Saturday September 10<sup>th</sup>. 21 4-Her's from eight different clubs attended the clinic at the East Texas Arboretum. Kids who attended ranged from Clover kids aged five to eight; to age 17, the turnout was great. The clinic covered good photography techniques, different photography elements, how to properly utilize your camera, and gave the 4-Her's some new photographing ideas. The clinic was requested by the Henderson County 4-H Adult Leaders and Parent Association to get more kids involved in 4-H photography. "It's one of the easiest ways to compete in 4-H but not many kids are involved", says Sandra Adair, club leader of Kickapoo 4-H. Only fourteen 4-Her's competed at the county and district level so the clinic was put together to recruit more involvement in 4-H photography as well. The 4-Hers had the opportunity to take pictures at the East Texas Arboretum with the techniques they learned fresh on their minds; and the help of adult leaders and Amy Lunceford from Amylu Photography.
